Cash and liquor seized by flying squad

PASIGHAT, March 22:

A total of 31,95,700 in cash, in addition to IMFL worth approximately Rs 32,410, were seized by the flying squad over the last two days here in East Siang district.

According to official information, the police seized Rs 1,50,000 from Mirmir Charali area, Rs 29,69,700 from near Kalibari, and Rs 76,500 from Raneghat area during a search operation on Thursday, March 21

Drug peddlers arrested

NAHARLAGUN, March 27:

A team of Naharlagun police led by OC inspector K. Dev apprehended three drug peddlers from various locations here under its 'Operation Dawn' on Tuesday, March 26.

The arrested persons were identified as Puni Mossang (21), Kadum Yomso (31) and Rei John (19).

The police seized 50 vials and one polythene packet containing suspected contraband drug (heroin) weighing approximately 76.8 grams. Additionally, 117 empty vials were seized from their possession.

The team was supervised by Naharlagun SP Mihin Gambo and SDPO Paul Jerang, said an official release.

Pasighat WPS arrested alleged rapist

PASIGHAT, March 26:

As per East Siang Superintendent of Police Dr. SK Singhal Pasighat police under his supervision has arrested one Tabang Taboh, 39yrs from Kaying village, under Siang on Friday (Mar-22) last in connection with an attempt to murder and rape case which was registered at Women Police Station (WPS) Pasighat vide WPS Psg c/no.12/2024 u/s 341/325/307/376/506 IPC.

SP Singhal informed that after a night long search, the alleged accused who was intentionally evading arrest and heading towards Siang district was nabbed by OC WPS Pasighat Ojum Riba under his supervision with the help of Pangin police comprising of DySP S. Tenzin, SI M. Rambo and their team had successfully intercepted the alleged accused at Pangin who was on the run after committing the offence.

"It was officially exchanged on 21 March at RGU, in the presence of RGU VC Prof Saket Kushwaha,

PPHF director (operation) Varghese C Joseph, and NEAPPL director Bipu Saharia," the university informed in a release.

Prof Kushwaha expressed hope that the MoU would be "instrumental in improvising the youths of Arunachal Pradesh to get cutting edge academic and research exposure, as the state is a hub to various citrus food and other agricultural crops, though we don't have any functional food processing unit as of now."

Tedir and 7 others file nominations

ZIRO, March 27:

A total of eight candidates filed their election nomination papers for the 16th Yachuli and 17th Ziro-Hapoli assembly constituencies here on Wednesday, March 27.

Returning officers for the assembly constituencies Vivek HP and Himani Meena informed that for the Yachuli assembly constituency seat, Taba Tedir from BJP, Toko Tatung from NCP and Toko Takam and Toko Chada as independent have filed their nomination papers.

For the Ziro-Hapoli assembly constituency seat, Hage Appa from the BJP, Tapi Mali from the PPA, Hage Nama and Hage Kobing as independent candidates have filed their nominations.

DEO Vivek HP further informed that so far 1334 or 55% percent arms

deposit had taken place in the twin districts of Lower Subansiri and Keyi Pan-yor.

"We want to ensure 100 % arms deposit in the twin districts.

Hence, the time limit for arms deposit will be extended for a few more days and I once again appeal to all the license holders of the twin districts to deposit their arms at their nearest police stations lest their licenses are cancelled," appealed the DC-cum-DEO Vivek H.P.

Meanwhile, the students of St. Claret College performed a street play on 'Voting Rights' at the Gandhi Market traffic point. The voting awareness campaign will also be performed in other areas of the districts to generate more awareness on the importance of voting and to increase the turn out of the voters.

Apang files nomination papers, to contest from Nari-Koyu seat

Former chief minister Gegong Apang will contest the legislative assembly election from Nari-Koyu seat in Lower Siang district.

Apang filed his nomination papers for the 19 April assembly election on the last day on Wednesday, March 27 as a candidate from the Arunachal

CEO urges stakeholders to adhere to ECI guidelines



ITANAGAR, March 21:

State Chief Electoral Officer (CEO) Pawan Kumar Sain appealed to all stakeholders in the simultaneous assembly and parliamentary elections to adhere to the Election Commission of India's (ECI) guidelines.

Presiding over a meeting with representatives of all the political parties at Nirvachan Bhavan here on Thursday, March 21 the CEO highlighted the enforcement of the model code of conduct (MCC) in the state, such as seizure of money and other valuable items at nakas/check gates, etc.

The list of dos and don'ts for the candidates and political parties, to be observed from the announcement of the election until the completion of the process of election, was

circulated among the representatives during the meeting.

The CEO explained to the representatives the expenditure unit, affidavit, criminal antecedents, permits for vehicles, media certification and monitoring committee (MCMC), etc.

He informed that senior officer Toko Babu has been deputed to the CEO office to work as the public relations officer (PRO) to provide any clarification to all concerned.

Regarding security of candidates, the CEO informed that "security of any protectee or candidate cannot be compromised during election and security review committee headed by the chief secretary will look into security coverage to entitled public functionaries."

He said that state police will provide pilot and escort with security personnel to protected persons as per the ECI guideline.

State nodal officer for MCC, RK Sharma highlighted all the directions of ECI on "criminal antecedents."

State nodal officer for law & order, VM & security, Anant Mittal informed that "all the political party representatives may lodge complaint online in cVIGIL or helpline number 1950 with a verified allegations/factual data, if any, to reach at logical conclusion."

The meeting was attended by representatives of all the political parties, namely, BJP, NPP, NCP, INC, GSP, ADP and JD (U), said a release from Nirvachan Bhavan.

Election expenditure observer holds meeting

In connection with the upcoming elections 2024, election expenditure observer Nitin Kumar Jaiman, who arrived Pasighat yesterday held consultative meeting with various teams and committees under the Election Expenditure Monitoring (EEM) Cell on Thursday, March 21 at the Siang Guest House conference hall, Pasighat.

RGU inks MoU with FNVA, New Delhi



RONO HILLS, March 22:

A memorandum of understanding (MoU) was signed between Rajiv Gandhi University (RGU) and Foundation for Non-Violent Alternatives (FNVA), New Delhi, for academic and research collaborations.

The MoU, virtually signed on 15 March with the registrar of the university and the founding trustee of the FNVA as the signatories, was officially exchanged on 22 March, in the presence of RGU Vice Chancellor Prof Saket Kushwaha and FNVA trustee Dr OP Tandon.

Greening environment and enhancing livestock productivity through local tree fodder nursery & cultivation in fodder plots - a success story.

Introduction:

The natural vegetations serves immensely important for our food, air, water and shelter for the organisms in this world. The natural fodders which are commonly available in the natural forest areas serve as the sole source of fodders for the livestock especially for the Mithuns and cattle population in Arunachal Pradesh. These natural fodders in the forest are in the form of tree leaves, shrubs, herbs, creepers and grasses on which the states' livestock genetic resources especially Mithuns and cattle population solely depend upon under the prevailing 'Free – range management system' of livestock rearing.

The special importance of these local fodder trees of the forest base is that they are all Multi-purpose tree Species (MPTS). In addition to their importance as fodder values for the livestock, these MPTS serve as the food items (vegetables, fruits), medicines, timber and fuel for the human beings since time immemorial.

Need for intervention:

With the rapid deforestation due to massive timber operation, agriculture operation, urbanization etc is distorting the natural habitat of the animals and destroying the natural vegetations leading to declining of the feed and fodders availability which ultimately resulting question mark on survivability of both animals and mankind today. This situation is aggravated due to lack of proper land use planning and also lack of adequate identification, propagation and conservation of important natural vegetations of multipurpose utility plants abundantly available in the natural forest which serves as fuel, vegetables and other food values for mankind and fodders for the animals as well.

These natural vegetations of economic importance either in the form of herbs, shrubs, creepers or the trees needs collection, propagation and conservation for our proper utility through establishment of nurseries, cultivation in Demonstration plots. And for their further wide spread propagation it could be done through developing them in the nurseries in large scale and making their availability to the livestock farmers and inculcating them to cultivate on participatory approach at community level for their buffer stock of fodders for their livestock and for greening environment and enhancing the livestock productivity is the need of the hour.

Advantages of local Fodder Tree cultivation:

1. The plantation of the local fodder tree plants which are of Multi-Purpose Tree Species (MPTS) nature that will supply fodders (For animals), Vegetables, medicines, timber and fuel (For the human beings).

For example, Ficushirta ("Taachin" in Nyishi) is main ingredient for soya bean fermentation used as food item and its delicate leaves serve as galacto-gaque (helps milk secretion in mothers) in addition to fodders for the animals. Bauhinia Species serve as Multi-purpose tree species which serves as fodders for animals in addition to food value for human beings (delicate leaves as vegetables, matured seeds as food item) and stem cutting serve as live wooden post in fencing of an area.

2. The fodder trees (when grown up) are perennial nature and supply fodders round the year at 1 to 3 months interval with increase in quantum of fodder production with advancement of age unlike the seasonally cultivated fodders.

3. The plantation of the fodder trees will increase the green cover (greening the environment) thereby addressing the vital issue of climate change) in addition to increasing the livelihood opportunities of rural farmers which ultimately connects the individuals with the nature.

Concept of the approach:

In this regard, a total of 49 natural fodder species which are commonly relished by the Mithuns including other livestock in the state has been identified and documented (Heli, et.al 2009). All these naturally available tree fodder species which grows luxuriantly in the natural for-

est can be developed and grown in the fodder nurseries through seeds/seedlings collected from the forests. Further, they can be propagated in the Fodder plots in the form of Fodder Demonstration plots for demonstration to the livestock farmers to inculcate them to cultivate in their own/ community forest land area for the buffer stocks of fodders especially during lean seasons for augmenting their livestock productivity.

1. Interventions:

To address these issues of the scarcity of the feed & fodders for the livestock, a noble proposal was initiated under Flexi-Fund programme of RastryaKrishiVikashYojana (RKVY) RAFTAAR 2017-18 wherein 3(three) units of Local Tree Fodder cultivation in Nursery and Fodder Demo. Plots were sanctioned against Central Cattle Breeding Farm, Nirjuli.

In this, the local tree fodder seeds/seedlings commonly relished by the livestock and found to be more nutritious (documented by Heli, et. al. 2009) viz. Ficusroxburghii (Taok), Bauheaniasps. (Gaay), Ficushirta (Taak-chin), altocarpush-exacordus (Jack fruit) were collected from natural forests and raised in nursery in poly bags for further transplantation in Fodder Demonstration Plots.

Further for the sustainable and bumper fodder harvest, an innovative approach of value addition was done in Tree fodder Demo. Plots by inter-cropping with different Perennial grasses including certain species of local fodder grasses viz, seteriapamifolia (Aruna grass) and Thysolauna maxima (pool jaru) and also napier grass etc as to get fodders round the year in a sustainable way and from very first year of plantation.

2. Objectives:

With the back drop that our live stocks solely depend on naturally available local fodders and to address the fodder scarcity following objectives were proposed:

2.1. To conserve and propagate locally and naturally available Fodder trees species commonly relished by the Mithuns and other livestock.

2.2. To inculcate the farmers for growing local fodder trees seedlings by giving them first-hand knowledge on seedlings raising in nursery for plantation and the package of practices in plantation of seedlings and other management demonstrated in various sub-plots in the Fodder Demonstration plots.

2.3. To demonstrate the various technologies for the fodder production and conservation through nursery raising and Fodder Demonstration Plots to the farming community with the background concept of seeing is believing principle.

The main initiative or specific objective of establishing Tree Fodder Nursery & cultivation in Fodder Demonstration plot was to address 2- vital issues faced in Central Cattle Breeding, Nirjuli were-

a. To check the rampant land encroachment by the local inhabitants on Govt. land.

b. To supply adequate green fodders thereby addressing acute fodder shortage in the Cattle Breeding Farm, Nirjuli.

3. Methodology & approach:

Before the onset of the fodder development activities, the basis of selection of tree fodder species were framed which are commonly relished by the livestock, more palatable, multi-purpose tree species (MPTS), adaptable in locality and more nutritious (based on study of Heli, et. al. 2009) viz. Ficusroxburghii, Ficushirta, Ficushlomerata, orechnideintegrifolia, Bauhineasps. etc.

3.1. Survey of the area and land development – The site for the tree fodder cultivation is properly surveyed for the nursery as well as Fodder demonstration plot at the very outset.

3.1.1. Tree Fodder nursery development:

3.1.1.1. Land development for the Nursery – The land area measuring 200 sq. m. is surveyed and earmarked for the nursery followed by erection of Netlon shed constructed with locally available materials (wooden/bamboos etc.).

3.1.1.2. Collection of Farm yard manure (FYM) and storage in Nursery.

3.1.1.3. Land preparation for Seed/seedling beds.

3.1.1.4. Land preparation and collection soil collection followed by mixing with FYM and keeping readiness for poly-bagging.

3.1.1.5. Poly-bagging and keeping in readiness for the seedling plantation.

3.1.1.6. Collection of local tree fodder seedlings from the natural or nearby natural forest area and transplantation in the ready poly-bags.

3.1.1.7. Watering of transplanted seedlings every alternate day depending upon weather condition.

3.1.1.8. Weeding and pest management of the poly-bagged seedlings.

3.1.1.9. Re-plantation of dried up seedlings in poly-bags.

Note: In general, the Tree fodder seedlings are ready for transplantation by 2- 4 months.

3.2. Tree Fodder Demonstration Plot development:

3.2.1. Boundary Fencing – The entire boundary of the fodder plot is secured with fencing to check the tress-passing of animals. In this, cement Concrete (CC) posts of 3"x 3" size with 5.5' height were fixed with spacing of 10 feet post to post and in between 2 Nos. wooden post fixed at first. After the posts were fixed, Phase-wire fencing (interlocked) with height of 4.5' were erected and fixed with the standing fencing posts as standard length specified.

3.2.2. Pit digging and manuring- Before plantation of tree fodder seedlings, the pits were dug with specification of 2'x 2'x 2' size with top soil removed and kept maintaining inter-pit distance of 3 metres in straight rows and columns. After pits were dug, FYM mixed with Top soil is again filled into pit and left for at least 7 -10 days for decaying.

3.2.3. Transportation of Tree fodder Seedlings- The required nos. nursery raised poly-bagged seedlings from the nursery are transported to the plantation site in the Fodder Demonstration Plot.

Transplantation of Tree fodder seedlings – After piling the poly bag at the bottom surface, the nursery raised tree fodder seedlings were transplanted in the ready up pit in the plot and tightening up the soil followed by watering in the next day. While planting, specific tree fodder species were planted in specific plots earmarked as to have different species of tree fodder species were maintained in a particular Fodder demonstration plot. As such, 2,000 Tree fodder seedlings are planted in 0.5 Hectares of farm land.

3.3. Inter-cropping with perennial grasses (A Value addition chapter with Tree fodders): In this value addition chapter, 2- tier system of fodder production is discussed wherein the bottom layer is projected for the perennial grass development and the top layer for the tree fodder leaves and twigs development. From this approach, one could obtain fodder from both the layers at the specified time frame.

This value addition of perennial grasses with Fodder tree done is to have sustainable fodder production round the year from that plot which helps in weed management which reduces the labour costs for maintenance of fodder tree plant plot. Moreover, the fodder seedling transplanted will require 1.5 -2 years period to yield fodders for the livestock.

The tree fodder plot is inter-cropped with the perennial grasses – viz. napier, guinea grass, seteriapamifolia (Aruna grass), congo signal etc. to achieve bumper fodder production. These inter-cropped perennial grasses will be bottom layer and fodder tree plant will serve as the top layer thereby achieving 2 –tier system of sustainable fodder production round the year. These perennial grasses requires 2-3 months period to yield fodder which can be harvested on monthly /interval basis to supply fodders to the livestock. The monthly or quarterly basis harvesting of inter-cropped perennial fodder grasses (between the fodder tree plants) helps in clearing the weeds thereby cut down the maintenance

cost of fodder tree plants from very 1st Year itself. The inter-cropped perennial grasses will sustain and continue fodder production till the fodder tree attains 2 years and thereafter it will be discontinued after the fodder tree branches becomes bushy and shady.

3.3.1. Plantation of perennial grasses within particular fodder species plot–

The plantation is done between the tree fodder plants maintaining equal distance from particular plant in straight rows with particular spacing of 1.5 metre distance plant to plant.

3.3.2. Plantation to demarcate between the different fodder tree species –

The perennial grasses are planted as bunds as to demarcate plots of different tree fodder species so as to have different bunds round the particular tree fodder species within the particular Fodder Demonstration plot.

3.3.3. Manuring with FYM –

The fodder tree plants and perennial grasses require replenishment of nutrients for their optimum growth. The properly decayed organic manure (Cow dung) is applied in the base area portion of the plants @ 1-2 kg/plant and for the perennial grasses are applied ad. Libitum at their basin portions during the lean seasons (winter months) annually. With the optimum quantum of organic manure application in the fodder plot, more quantity of fodders is produced from the perennial grasses and fodder trees will attain higher growth rate (faster growth).

In practise, immediately after plantation of perennial grasses between the fodder trees and bunds around different fodder species, the properly digested or decayed organic farm yard manure are applied in the base area of individual plants to enrich them with nutrients .

3.3.4. Watering and re-plantations-

The planted perennial grasses are regularly watered along with Tree fodder species plants time to time depending upon the weather conditions. The doubted seedlings are re-planted as per the requirement of the plot.

The inter-cropping of perennial fodder grasses innovative approach of sustainable fodder production round the with Tree fodders cultivation is an year. In this, it is done to attain self-sufficiency in fodder production & supply to the livestock for augmenting their productivity

4. Results and impacts:

Perennial local fodder tree cultivation in nurseries and Fodder Demonstration Plots with the value addition chapter of inter-cropping with the perennial fodder grasses of 2-tier system of fodder production (Trees as Top layer and grasses as bottom layer) has been an innovative approach of sustainable fodder production round the year with the following impacts:

4.1. The perennial fodder grasses planted are harvested after 3-4 months of plantation in the 1st year itself followed by subsequent harvest every after 1-2-months interval with average fodder yield of 2-3 quintals/acre. With the harvest of the perennial grasses, the labour cost for weeding the transplanted fodder tree seedlings is saved.

4.2. The first cutting of tree fodders from the grown up Tree fodder plants are after 1.5 -2 years of plantation with average yield of 0.5 -1.0 quintal/acre in first season (Summer) followed by subsequent harvest in 2nd cutting (after 2 months of 1st cutting) with average Yield of 2 quintals/acre (during rainy season) and 2—2.5 Quintals (Winter season) and thereafter anticipated increase in yield of fodder in the subsequent years.

4.3. The quantity of fodder yield per fodder Tree ranges from 3-4 kg in first cutting with the increase in fodder production with the advancement of age of plant with average of 2.5 – 3.5 quintals/acre in later stage.

4.4. The green cover of Central Cattle Breeding Farm, Nirjuli has been improved with standing green-lush tree fodder (at top) and greenish perennial grass beneath it

(bottom layer) thereby addressing the scarcity of fodders especially during lean seasons which was barren land during winter season earlier.

4.5. The govt. farm land encroachment by the local public has been checked as the entire vacant fodder land has been secured with boundary fencing and the plot has the standing Tree fodder covered with perennial grasses beneath distancing their guts to encroach it.

In addition to checking of the land encroachment problem and supply of adequate fodders, the Tree Fodder Nursery and Demo. Plot has been the Centre of attraction for the Extension functionaries as well as farmers of the state where almost every day visitors throng in to get first-hand information on sustainable fodder production. This Fodder Tree Nursery and cultivation in Demo Plots has been the first of its own kind serving as the learning Centre for the farmers as to know about the commonly relished locally available fodders and their package of practices on improved fodder production thereby reaping bumper livestock products.

5. Scope and potentials:

With this initiative of the innovative approach of cultivating local MPTS plants (identified as most commonly relished fodders and highly nutritious nature in the fodder nurseries through poly-bagging and cultivating them in the Fodder Demo. Plots could be the eye-opener for many of the inquisitive livestock farmers.

5.1. Livelihood option: With the back drop of Extension Education principle – "Seeing is believing and learning by doing" in developing the tree fodder seedlings (collected from the natural forest) in the poly-bags in the fodder nurseries, the farmers could make their earnings by developing them and selling it to their fellow farmers.

5.2. Enhancing income source: An individual farmer could earn their livelihood through livestock rearing by cultivating these nutritious fodder trees with the value addition of inter-cropping of perennial grasses along it as to have sustainable approach of fodder production round the year for their livestock and minimize the production cost as feeding alone accounts 60-70% of total livestock production cost. More over, the surplus fodder produced could be sold to the fellow farmers and earn additional income.

6. Constraints encountered:

A series of issues has been encountered in collection, nursery raising and propagation of local fodder tree species seeds/seedlings during the work in progress enumerated as under:

6.1. Inadequate availability of seeds/seedlings –

Collection of local fodder tree seeds/seedlings from the different locations had been a challenging one as getting sufficient quantity/nos. of seedlings was difficult. Many a times, one had to return in empty hand without getting the seeds/seedlings. These seedlings grow in specific locations viz. in the freshly burnt jhum plot, freshly land developed or land slide area and in the locations of birds drooping spots etc. but seldom beneath their fruiting trees except for few species viz. bauhinia sps. During the work in progress, it was also experienced that the ripped fruits/seeds were collected and tried for germination in the seed beds in nursery which does not sprout at all.

6.2. Poor survivability of seedlings-

Some of the local fodder tree seedlings especially ficus species and orechnideintegrifolia mortality rate is high in poly bags at the nursery level as well as in plantation plots. It requires utmost care immediately after transplanted in poly bags as well as in fodder plots especially it requires protection from scorching heat of sun and also needs watering till 7-10 days period after transplantation.

7. Way forward:
7.1. At Parent Departmental level –

Initiatives shall be taken to establish 2(two) perennial local fodder tree nurseries with the Fodder

Demonstration plots at Veterinary Training Institute Pasighat in East Siang district (Central Zone) and Cattle Breeding Farm, Nirjuli, Papum Pare district (Western zone). In these 2 Nurseries, efforts shall be taken to collect the seeds/seedlings commonly relished by the livestock and grow them in poly bags (in Nurseries) in sufficient numbers for meeting up the perennial local fodder tree seedling demands in the state. The nurseries as well as local Fodder Demonstrations will show-case the sustainable fodder production which will inculcate the progressive farmers to augment their livestock productivity of the state With the local fodder tree seedling production and show-casing them in the Fodder Demo. Plots, efforts shall be taken to study and document plant growth rate (at nursery & fodder plot level), suitable stage of harvesting (1st cutting), quantum of fodder yield/tree, duration between cuttings (gapping period), quantum of fodder yield in different season and palatability trial of particular species of fodder in animals (Preference by animals).

7.2. Convergence with other allied Deptts-

Attempts have planned for both Research & Development (R & D) on local tree fodder seeds/seedlings by converging with the allied wings/deptt for the sustainable fodder production. Efforts will be taken to improve the package of practices evolved and tested (Technology) will be spread horizontally down to the end users(Farmers) for augmenting the crop productivity as well as greening the environment enlisted as under:

For example, Convergence with State Forest Research Institute(SFRI) – For the seed treatment of selected MPTS/Fodder Trees seeds so as to design protocols that could be redesigned for the availability of the local tree fodder for transplanting in poly bags at the nursery level.

Secondly, converging with R&D Mission (Horticulture Deptt.) the MPTS for the phyto-chemistry study as to document their chemical composition which may be important for the medicinal or production importance.

Conclusion:

Arunachal Pradesh is bestowed with diverse plant genetic resources conducive for the livestock rearing indeed and on these locally available fodders in the natural forest, our animal genetic resources solely depends upon them for their growth and productivity. For the same, there is an urgent need for proper land-use policy framed identifying and declaration of specific Community forests areas for community level livestock rearing especially for the Mithuns restricting other activities within such earmarked areas.

Considering the immense importance of the Multi-Purpose Tree Species (MPTS) which has not only the importance for the fodders for animals but also it has the importance for food (vegetables, fruits), timber, fuel and medicinal values in addition to greening the environment for addressing the prevailing climate change. It is the felt need at this hour for their conservation under the prevailing trend of massive deforestation for the diversified operations for food, shelter and other needs. This innovative approach of sustainable fodder production round the year especially inter-cropping with perennial grasses which has been time tested for augmenting the livestock productivity, opens a new horizon for the livestock farmers in enhancing their livelihood opportunities. There is an urgent need for policy decision and resource supports for replicating this innovative fodder production approach in more and more new locations in the state for attaining self-sufficiency in livestock products and widening the employment opportunities of unemployed youths in the state. With more plantation of MPTS plants especially for the fodders in the locality, more farmers will be inculcated in cultivating them thereby more individuals will be linking with the nature for greening the environment which ultimately will address today's burning climate change issues.

World Tuberculosis Day observed at Namsai



NAMSAI, March 24:

The National Tuberculosis Elimination Programme, Namsai, to observe World Tuberculosis Day, organized a short Marathon involving the students of Arunachal University of Studies - AUS, Namsai on 24th March 2024.

The participants consisted of equal numbers of boys and girls. The day, 24th March, is being commemorated every year to mark the discovery of the bacilli Mycobacteria Tuberculosis, the causative organism of Tuberculosis, by the German Physician Dr. Robert Koch on this day in the year 1882. This year the theme of the World TB Day is – Yes! We can end TB.

Flagging off the marathon and later speaking as Chief Guest on the occasion, C.R Khampa, Deputy Commissioner, Namsai congratulated all the winners and also the participants for completing the marathon. He appreciated their participation to run for the important cause of eliminating TB from Namsai.

Dwelling on the theme of this year, he emphasized on the economic loss to the country due to the high number of TB burden and the importance of all the stakeholders to end TB at their level to further stop the spread of infection.
