SEC announces By-Election to vacant PRI seats on Nov 6

ITANAGAR, October 11:

Arunachal Pradesh State Election Commission announced By-Elections to 54 (Fifty-Four) vacancies of Gram Panchayat Constituencies and 2(Two) Zilla Parishad Constituencies spread over to 23 (Twenty-Three) districts to be conducted on November 6, 2023.

The vacancies came up due to various reasons like death, resignation or otherwise etc have occurred as on date, informed State Election Commissioner Rinchin Tashi during a press conference here on October 6 last.

The By Election schedule has been fixed as – issue of Public Notice by State Election Commission and Returning Officers on 09/10/2023 (Monday), last date of filing nomination on 16/10/2023 (Monday), date of scrutiny is on 18/10/2023 (Wednesday), last date of withdrawal of nomination is on 21/10/23 (Saturday), while date of poll is fixed on 6/11/2023 (Monday) and counting will be held on 8/11/2023 (Wednesday) and the date by which election is to be completed is on 10/11/2023 (Friday).

The General Election to Panchayati Raj Institutions was held in December 2020 followed

by 1st By-elections in the month of July 2022.

The Special Summary Revision of the Electoral Rolls of the concerned vacant Panchayat Constituencies which is a prerequisite to any By-elections has been done with respect to 01/01/2023 as the qualifying date and the final publication of E/Rolls has also been completed on 25.9.2023.

73 (Seventy-Three) Polling Stations would be involved during the By elections of 2 (two) ZP Constituencies and 54 (Fifty Four) GP Constituencies and more than 500 (Five Hundred) election officials are expected to be involved during the By-election excluding the security personnel, the SEC Tashi informed, adding that with regards to the security assessment, it shall be done by the concerned District Election Officers (DEOs)/DMs as per the prevailing situations and inputs given by the Superintendent of Police of concerned districts.

With a view to ensure holding of free, fair and peaceful By-elections to all the Gram Panchayat and Zilla Parishad Constituencies in the State of Arunachal Pradesh and

It shall apply to Political Parties, Contesting Candidates, MPs/Ministers/Advisors/MLAs, Employees of the State/Central Government, Central and State Government Public Undertakings, Government approved private projects including Hydropower Projects, Local bodies' functionaries and other public servants. Since, By-election has now been announced, the Model Code of Conduct (MCC) of the Commission shall come into force with immediate effect in the jurisdiction of respective ZP Constituencies or GP Constituencies concerned.

Hence, in order to ensure free, fair and peaceful By-election across the state, the State Election Commission appealed to all stake holders - electors, candidates, political parties and the public at large to extend their full support and cooperation to the State election machineries during the entire By-election process.

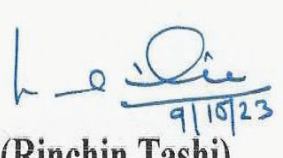

BeFriend Mind for Mental Health & Wholistic Well-Being for All: Let's Make It Reality as a Universal Human Right

(Thoughts on World Mental Health Day -10th October)

(Prof. Dr. Jayadeba Sahoo, Faculty, Brahma Kumaris, RERF & Professor (Ex_Dean & Head), Faculty of Education, Rajiv Gandhi (Central) University, Itanagar, Arunachal Pradesh,

“स्वास्थ्यं गुणस्य, धनस्य, भोगस्य, मोक्षस्य च परा आधारः।”

योगाः आरोग्यस्य, सुजीवनस्य, जीवनस्य अपनिशकाः भवन्ति।

“Health is the supreme foundation of virtue, wealth, enjoyment and salvation.

Diseases are destroyers of health, of good life, and even of life itself”.

This statement was made by Charaka, one of the oldest physicians of India, about 2500 years ago; a statement that rings true for all time. Extending the concept of health, he observed significantly, “Life is spoken of as the union of the body, mind and spirit that support animation, flux and the link between the past life and the future”. The World Health Organization (WHO) defines health as “a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being and not merely the absence of disease or infirmity.” This implies that mental health should not be neglected in our quest to attain good health. With this principle in mind, WHO has designated 10th October as World Mental Health Day to raise awareness for mental health and drive a positive change for everyone's mental health.

Mental health is essential to our overall well-being and as important as physical health. When we feel mentally well, we can work productively, enjoy our free time and contribute actively to our communities. In recent years, there has been increasing acknowledgement of the important role mental health plays in achieving global development goals, as illustrated by the inclusion of mental health in the Sustainable Development Goals. That's why 'Mental Health and Wellbeing' is a part of the 17 Sustainable Development Goals. It comes under SDG goal 3 that not only focuses on physical health, but mental health as well. As per the goal, the target is to reduce one-third premature mortality from non-communicable diseases through prevention and treatment and promote 'Mental Health and Well-Being' by 2030.

What Is The Importance of World Mental Health Day?

World Health Organisation(WHO) states globally, around 280 million people of all ages suffer from depression, whereas around 1 in 5 of the world's children and adolescents have a mental disorder and it is the leading cause of suicide among 15-29 year-olds. People with severe mental health conditions die prematurely – as much as two decades early – due to preventable physical conditions. It further adds that mental, neurological disorders make up 10% of the global burden of disease and 30% of non-fatal disease burden. Globally, “Such alarming statistics call for awareness to be raised about depression and anxiety,” Dr Isaac said. The Global Burden of Disease study estimated that nearly 200 million people in India have experienced a mental disorder, nearly half of whom suffer from depressive or anxiety disorders. India accounts for more than a third of the female suicides globally, nearly a fourth of all male suicides, and suicide has been the leading cause of death in young Indians.

- Globally, one in seven 10-19-year-olds experiences a mental disorder, accounting for 13% of the global burden of disease in this age group.
- Depression, anxiety and behavioural disorders are among the leading causes of illness and disability among adolescents.
- Suicide is the fourth leading cause of death among 15-29 year-olds.

- The consequences of failing to address adolescent mental health conditions extend to adulthood, impairing both physical and mental health and limiting opportunities to lead fulfilling lives as adults.

According to the National Health program by the Ministry of

health and family welfare, 6% of Kerala's population has mental disorders. 1 in a 5 has some emotional and behavioural problems. Close to 60 to 70 million people in the country suffer from common and severe mental disorders. India is the world's suicide capital with over 2.6 lakh cases of suicide in a year. WHO statistics say the average suicide rate in India is 10.9 for every lakh people.

WHO estimates that the burden of mental health problems in India is 2443 Disability-Adjusted Life Years (DALYs) per 10000 population; the age-adjusted suicide rate per 100000 population is 21.1. The economic loss due to mental health conditions, between 2012-2030, is estimated at USD 1.03 trillion.

The latest survey by India's National Institute of Mental Health and Neurosciences (NIMHANS) found that nearly 150 million Indians are in need of mental health care services, but fewer than 30 million are seeking care. “Over 10% of the population has diagnosable mental health or substance use disorder. Mental health is paramount, and getting treatment for mental disorders is not a luxury but a necessity,” Pratima Murthy, director of NIMHANS, told

Statistics show that 1 in every 5 individuals suffers from some form of mental health illness symptoms. 50% of mental health conditions begin by age 14 and 75% of mental health conditions develop by age 24.

Ministry of Family and Health survey also states that in India, one in every 12 elderly persons have symptoms of depression. One out of every two employees in corporate India suffers from anxiety and depression. An increase in alcohol consumption is another area of concern for mental health experts. Statistics report that 20% of 15-49 year-olds has increased their alcohol consumption during the pandemic.

The idea of celebrating World Mental Health Day took ground and created In 1992 by the World Federation of Mental Health led by the then deputy secretary-general, Richard Hunter. They didn't have a precise objective other than to advocate for mental health as a whole. To say the least, it was an uphill climb to change a plethora of bad and dangerous habits that were making a difficult situation worse for people. The world had a host of mental health issues that weren't properly being treated due to an overall ignorance in regards to what mental health actually is. The WFMH knew that they needed to act on a global scale to solve a global crisis.

The first World Mental Health Day theme was 'Improving the Quality of Mental Health Services throughout the World' in 1994. 27 countries sent feedback reports after the campaign and there were national campaigns in Australia and England. What Is The Theme of World Mental Health Day 2023?

Every year, the World Health Organisation marks October 10 as the World Mental Health Day, for global mental health education, awareness and advocacy against social stigma with the overall objective to raise awareness about mental

health issues around the world and to mobilize efforts in support of mental health. The Day provides an opportunity for all stakeholders working on mental health issues to talk about their work, and what more needs to be done to make mental health care a reality for people worldwide.

Every year, the day is marked with a particular theme. This year, 2023 the theme is 'Mental health is a universal human right' focusing “Our minds, our rights” to improve knowledge, raise awareness and drive actions that promote and protect everyone's mental health as a universal human right on reducing the gap between the 'haves' and the 'have nots' that is growing wider by every passing day and there is continuing unmet need in the care of people with a mental health problem. Mental health is a basic human right for all people. Everyone, whoever and wherever they are, has a right to the highest attainable standard of mental health. This includes the right to be protected from mental health risks, the right to available, accessible, acceptable, and good quality care, and the right to liberty, independence and inclusion in the community. Good mental health is vital to our overall health and well-being. Yet one in eight people globally are living with mental health conditions, which can impact their physical health, their well-being, how they connect with others, and their livelihoods. Mental health conditions are also affecting an increasing number of adolescents and young people.

The United Nations Declaration of Human rights articulates the 'right to the highest attainable standard of physical and mental health'. It is the right to comprehensive mental, physical and social well-being by every human being. This includes:

- the right to be protected from mental health risks
- the right to available, accessible, acceptable, and good quality care
- the right to liberty, independence and inclusion in the community.

World Federation for Mental Health that helped in choosing the theme of this year's World Mental Health day states that this theme aims to highlight that access to mental health services remains unequal, with 75% to 95% of people with mental disorders in low- and middle-income countries unable to access mental health services at all, and access in high income countries is not any better. It further states that many people with a mental illness do not receive the treatment that they are entitled to and deserve. Together with their families and caregivers continue to experience stigma and discrimination. This Day is an opportunity for organisations to raise awareness and funds for their work, for people to reach out to one another and call for change. “We need to act, and act urgently.”

He stressed the importance of protecting the environment to conserve biodiversity, acknowledging the heritage of the Apatani people of Ziro, who have long been stewards of their natural resources.

As a symbol of commitment to a cleaner environment, the DC distributed paper bags to promote a garbage-free environment and to uphold the dignity of labor. This gesture encapsulates the ethos of ZBM, which places a strong emphasis on sustainable practices and environmental conservation in Ziro.

The ZBM has attracted a diverse array of participants including enthusiastic young attendees eager to partake in the two-day camp nestled in the scenic Pange Valley. Accompanying them are expert scientists specializing in the study of butterflies and birds, as well as prominent NGO's such as the Apatani Youth Association and Apatani Women Association of Ziro. Additionally, the Gaon Bura-Gaon Buri Association has also lent their support to event. ZBM has been an annual tradition since its inception in 2014, organized by Ngunu Ziro in collaboration with the Forest Department.

ZBM holds a special place in the region, as it was the pioneering butterfly meet in Arunachal Pradesh, serving as an inspiration for similar events in Pasighat and

Namdapha. The core objective of this event is to inspire and educate local youth about the rich biodiversity and the importance of conservation. Notably, ZBM places a strong emphasis on sustainability, with cloth banners replacing traditional plastic ones, and a commitment to avoid single-use plastic water bottles throughout the event.

The event also featured an informative presentation about Tale Valley, established as a Wildlife Sanctuary in 1995 by converting a Reserve Forest. Encompassing 337 square kilometers and spanning altitudes from 1700 to 2700 meters, Tale Valley boasts a diverse flora and fauna. It is often referred as the "Floral Paradise" due to its abundant presence of over 100 medicinal plant species, 200 fern species, and 100 orchids and rhododendrons. Its fauna includes 409 different species of birds and various animals like the clouded leopard, black bear, and elephants.

During the meet, attendees were treated to a presentation on Ngunu Ziro and its impactful journey. The NGO has been actively involved in sustainable development and environmental conservation, implementing various initiatives aimed at preserving the region's ecology.

The historical significance of ZBM was also highlighted during the event, with participants recounting the discovery of the 'Kaser-i-Hind' butterfly during the very first meet in 2014. This discovery marked the first-ever photograph of this butterfly species. Subsequently, the team succeeded in identifying a new butterfly species called the 'Apatani Glory'.

ZBM's mission is to continue engaging youth in building local resources for ongoing conservation efforts. Expert scientists also delivered valuable talks during the meet, focusing on butterfly and environmental conservation.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

The applicants of both the above post should invariably be person of eminence in the Public life or in the field of Higher Education or who have remained Secretary or above to the Government of Arunachal Pradesh or held equivalent posts in the Government of India (GoI) for a period of not less than 3 (three) years. The Chairperson and the Members shall not be from the same field of specialization as mandated explicitly in the Section 4, Sub-Section (1) of "Arunachal Pradesh Private Educational Institutions (Regulatory Commission) Act, 2017".

TERMS & CONDITIONS

The Chairperson and Members of the Commission shall be appointed by the State Government on the recommendations of a Search Committee for a period of 3 (three) years or until he or she attains the age of 65 years, whichever is earlier, and such Chairperson or Member may be eligible for a second term subject to the upper age limit of 65 years. After the expiry of the term of office, the Chairperson or the Members, as the case may be, shall not be eligible for further employment or any assignment in any of the Private Educational Institutions within Arunachal Pradesh or their associate offices or Companies within or outside Arunachal Pradesh for a period of three years as mandated explicitly in the Section 4, Sub-Section (2) of "Arunachal Pradesh Private Educational Institutions (Regulatory Commission) Act, 2017".

NOTIFICATION

[Notification under Section-7 of the Aadhaar Act, 2016 for the State Schemes where beneficiaries are Other than Children]

Whereas, the use of Aadhaar as an identity document for delivery of services or benefits or subsidies simplifies the Government delivery processes, brings in transparency and efficiency, and enables beneficiaries to get their entitlements directly in a convenient and seamless manner by obviating the need to produce multiple documents to prove ones identity;

And whereas, the Department of Education through the Directorate of Higher & Technical Education, Govt, of Arunachal Pradesh, Itanagar (hereinafter referred to as the Department), is administering the following scheme:

- Arunachal Pradesh State Stipend Scheme**
- Post Matric Scholarships to ST students under Umbrella Scheme**

(Hereinafter referred to as the scheme) to [For award of Stipend and Scholarship to APST students studying within and outside the State of Arunachal Pradesh] which is being implemented through the [Directorate of Higer & Technical Education, Govt, of Arunachal Pradesh, Itanagar] (hereinafter referred to as the implementing Agency(ies));

And whereas, under the Scheme, (hereinafter referred to as the benefit) is given to the [APST students] (hereinafter referred to as the beneficiaries), by the implementing Agency as per the extant Scheme guidelines;

And whereas, the aforesaid Scheme involves recurring expenditure incurred from the Consolidated Fund of Arunachal Pradesh and Ministry of Tribal Affairs, Gol for Post Scholarship Scheme;

Now, therefore, in pursuance of section 7 of the Aadhaar (Targeted Delivery of Financial and other Subsidies, Benefits and services) Act, 2016 (18 of 2016) (hereinafter referred to as the said Act), the Government of Arunachal Pradesh hereby notifies the following, namely:-

1. (1) An individual eligible for receiving the benefits under the scheme shall hereby be required to furnish proof of possession of the Aadhaar number or undergo Aadhaar authentication.

(2) Any individual desirous of availing benefits under the Scheme, who does not possess the Aadhaar number or, has not yet enrolled for Aadhaar, shall be required to make application for Aadhaar enrolment before registering for the Scheme provided that he is entitled to obtain Aadhaar as per section 3 of the said Act, and such individuals shall visit any Aadhaar enrolment Centre (list available at the Unique Identification Authority of India (UIDAI) website www.uidai.gov.in to get enrolled for Aadhaar.

(3) As per regulation 12 of the Aadhaar (Enrolment and Update) Regulations, 2016, the Department through its implementing Agency, is required to offer Aadhaar enrolment facilities for the beneficiaries who are not yet enrolled for Aadhaar and in case there is no Aadhaar enrolment Centre located in the respective Block or Taluka or Tehsil, the Department through its implementing Agency shall provide Aadhaar enrolment facilities at convenient locations in coordination with the existing Registrars of UIDAI or by becoming a UIDAI Registrar themselves:

Provided that till the time Aadhaar is assigned to the individual, benefits under the scheme shall be given to such individual, subject to the production of the following documents, namely:

(a) if he/she has enrolled, his/her Aadhaar Enrolment identification slip; and

(b) any one of the following documents, namely :

- Bank or Post office passbook with photo; or
- Permanent Account Number (PAN) Card; or
- Passport; or
- Ration Card; or
- Voter identity Card; or
- MGNREGA card, or
- Kisan Photo passbook, or
- (viii) Driving license issued by the Licensing Authority under the Motor Vehicles Act, 1988

(59 of 1988); or

(ix) certificate of identity having photo of such person issued by a Gazetted Officer or a Tehsildar on an official letter head; or

(x) any other document as specified by the Department Provided further that the above documents may be checked by an officer specifically designated by the Department for that purpose.

2. In order to provide benefits to the beneficiaries under the scheme conveniently, the Department through its implementing Agency shall make all the required arrangements to ensure that wide publicity through the media shall be given to the beneficiaries to make them aware of the said requirement.

3. In all cases, where Aadhaar authentication fails due to poor biometrics of the beneficiaries or due to any other reason, the following remedial mechanisms shall be adopted, namely:-

(a) in case of poor fingerprint quality, iris scan or face authentication facility shall be adopted for authentication, thereby the Department through its implementing Agency shall make provisions for iris scanners or face authentication along with finger-print authentication for delivery of benefits in seamless manner;

(b) in case the biometric authentication through fingerprints or iris scan or face authentication is not successful, wherever feasible and admissible authentication by Aadhaar one Time password or Time-based One-Time Password with limited time validity, as the case may be, shall be offered;

(c) in all other cases where biometric or Aadhaar one Time password or Time-based One-Time password authentication is not possible, benefits under the Scheme may be given on the basis of physical Aadhaar letter whose authenticity can be verified through the Quick Response (QR) code printed on the Aadhaar letter and the necessary arrangement of QR code reader shall be provided at the convenient locations by the Department through its implementing Agency.

4. In addition to the above, in order to ensure that no bona fide beneficiary under the scheme is deprived of his due benefits, the Department through its implementing Agency shall follow the exception handling mechanism as outlined in the office Memorandum of DBT Mission, cabinet secretariat, Government of India dated 19th December 2017.

5. This notification shall come into force with immediate effect.
