12 houses gutted in fire in Daporijo

DAPORIJO, January 22: 12 houses were completely burnt and 2 other houses partially damaged by a fire mishap that broke out in Polo Colony here in Upper Subansiri district at around 10 pm on Tuesday. No casualties are reported so far.

Deputy Commissioner Tasso Gambo and DDMO in-charge C.K Namchoom rushed to the spot to assess the damages. Immediate relief packages were distributed to the victims, the release said.

Various organizations including Reri Welfare Society came forward and donated relief items to the fire victims, the release further said.

Pipsorang gets road connectivity in 78 years



PIPSORANG, January 22:

Pipsorang, an administrative unit of Tali constituency in Kra Daadi district, got road connectivity after 78 years of independence. Another milestone achieved, another promise fulfilled.

Marking the historic development, Chief Minister Pema Khandu, along with Union Minister Kiren Rijiju, Rajya Sabha MP NabamRebia and state's Urban Development minister Balo Raja, travelled to Pipsorang, recently up-

graded to a SDO headquarter, by road from Tali in Kra-Dadi district, to be precise in Tali assembly constituency, the only constituency in the state that remained unconnected till 2022.

On February 27, 2022, Khandu opened the road to Tali by reaching the last unconnected administrative center travelling all the way from Itanagar by road. He joined the Nyokum festivities there achieving two milestones – the first chief minister to reach Tali by road

and the first chief minister to join Nyokum celebrations at Tali.

"The next goal is to travel by road from Tali to Pipsorang in the next couple of years," he had announced. Today he did it.

Congratulating local legislator JikkeTako, Rural Works Department, local administration, the contractor and people of Tali administrative center for the milestone, Khandu urged them to ensure completion of the entire project within one month.

He observed that newly constructed road needed gradient modifications and alignment changes at various points to avoid steep climbs and sharp turns.

He advised K C Dhimole, Technical Advisor to the state government, who accompanied him in the trip, to assess, re-align and re-design and complete the process within a month.

Khandu directed the concerned Executive Engineer to constantly monitor the progress and visit the sites frequently.

"The Assistant Engineer, in-charge of the project, should visit the sites and stay overnight to oversee the work and the Junior Engineers should stay on the ground, sleep in the camps and coordinate with the contractor till completion of the project," he said.

Union MoS of WCD calls on the Governor

The Union Minister of State of Women and Child Development, Savitri Thakur called on the Governor of Arunachal Pradesh Lt. General KT Parnaik, PVSM, UYSM, YSM (Retd.) at Raj Bhavan, Itanagar on Saturday, January 18. They discussed issues related to Anganwadi Services including supplementary nutrition, preschool non-formal education, nutrition & health education, immunization, health check-ups and referral services. State WCD Minister Dasanglu Pul, who accompanied the Union Minister, was also present in the meeting.

The Governor, while welcoming the minister to Arunachal Pradesh said that her visit to the State will boost the implementation of welfare programmes and projects under the Women and Child Development Ministry and also provide them ground reality of the State and region for their future planning. He commended the services provided by the ICDS (Integrated Child Development Services) officials, Anganwadi workers and Anganwadi helpers and said that they empower women to live

with dignity and nurture children with full opportunities for growth and development in a safe and protective environment.

Sharing his interactions with Anganwadi workers during his district tours, the Governor suggested the Union Minister of State of Women and Child Development enhance the financial remuneration and incentives for the service providers. He said that as the population is sparsely distributed, the Anganwadi workers and Anganwadi helpers have to cover large areas in challenging terrain and climatic conditions, particularly for immunization and supplementary nutrition.

The Governor also suggested enhancing the financial support for the construction of Anganwadi center buildings. He said that due to difficult terrain and remoteness, the construction costs escalate and need pragmatic rate costs for soft and hard regions.

The Union Minister of State appreciated the suggestions and assured the Governor to address the requirements of Arunachal Pradesh.

Pipsorang gets road connectivity...

Khandu observed that even if the road is still 'kutcha' the ease of connectivity it has brought all of a sudden to the people of Pipsorang and nearby villages is huge.

"I assume 30% work still remains for its completion and I assure the people that it will be done within a month," he said.

The 55 km Tali to Pipsorang road is being executed by RWD under the flagship PMGSY scheme.

The Chief Minister reiterated that the government's top priority is road connectivity and assured approval and sanction of roads to yet-to-be connected villages in the area as urged by the local MLA.

These include Tali-Pipsorang road to Haa village, Nyobia to Keba, Ripum to Raha village and upgradation of the road from Roing to Lodo Kore village.

Recalling his last trip to Tali in 2022, Khandu said that the stretch from the Joram-Koloriang Trans-Arunachal Highway to Yangte was in very poor condition. He informed that funds were sanctioned for upgradation of that stretch soon after.

"I am happy to note that work on that stretch has begun on ground. Next time I will come by road from Itanagar to Yangte-Tali and all the way to Pipsorang," he said.

Informing that about 1300 villages across the state are yet to be connected by road, Khandu assured that no stones will remain unturned to connect all these villages in the next few years.

He further informed that several projects, mostly road construction, worth Rs 515 crore were ongoing in the assembly segment and announced new sanctions worth Rs 44.50 crore.

The newly sanctioned projects include infrastructure creation for Pipsorang SDO office, infrastructure development for newly established administrative circles of Paya and Nyorik and construction of the Tali township roads.

Khandu also assured to provide funds for construction of an outdoor stadium at Taki to tap the sporting potentials of the youth.

He advised local MLA JikkeTako to stay put in his assembly constituency and regularly monitor all ongoing and upcoming projects for quality and timely completion.

"If the local MLA is at station, officials and contractors will remain in station ensuring smooth progress of the projects," Khandu added.

Meanwhile, the Chief Minister inaugurated the newly constructed Boa Sango to Neomi road and a Circuit House at Tali. He also laid the foundation stones for a road from Tugmar to Guha under CRIF and Parsi Parlo PWD road Kopin to Hapuk, Pija to Habak, Tali-Pija PGSY road to Richik and Tali-Pija PMGSY road to Neopum under the Vibrant Village Programme.

Day 2 of DC's Conference focuses on...

The deliberations based on identified themes – Swasth Arunachal, Samridh Arunachal, Sundar Arunachal, Surakshit Arunachal, Shikshit Arunachal and Swachh Arunachal, discussed various issues, challenges and possible measures to further accelerate the pace of development, besides realising the goal of building a Shashakt, Shikshit and Viksit Arunachal Pradesh.

Earlier, the day began with a session on "Surakshit Arunachal," where Secretary RWD, Nitu Tsering Glow spoke on drug abuses and accidents. He was followed by DC Roing & DC Namsai in presenting their thematic stories of their respective districts. This followed a special session on 'Challenges of Saturation', led by Secretary Planning & Investment R.K Sharma. The morning session concluded with a discussion on "Shikshit Arunachal," where Working Group E and DCs presented their thematic stories, followed by a special session on 'issues relating to land acquisition', initiated by Secretary Land Management.

The afternoon session had a discussion on "Swachh Arunachal," where Working Group C and DCs presented their thematic stories in regards to the theme. Later, Secretary Planning & Investment highlighted the 'role and expectations from the Guardian Ministers and Mentor Secretaries' in a special session. The day concluded with a feedback session moderated by the Commissioner to CM, followed by key takeaways from the conference presented by the Principal Secretary.

Programs like Atma-Nirbhar Bhagwati Yojana (ANBY), Atma-Nirbhar Krishi Yojana (ANKY), etc are designed to empower farming communities across the state," he stated. He further added that substantial funding has been allocated to these programs to promote agricultural development in Arunachal Pradesh.

He also addressed one of the primary concerns faced by the farmers of Arunachal Pradesh about the marketing of their agricultural produce.

"I am aware of the challenges faced by our farmers, where sometimes even good produces are sold at distress prices". He said there is an urgent need for post-harvest management solutions and suggested the establishment of food processing units for value addition, and the establishment of a Mandi in the Siang Belt.

He urged the entrepreneurs to explore such initiatives which will improve the economic conditions of the farmers as they will directly sell their products to the consumers/wholesaler instead of going through the middlemen.

In his speech, Mein also underscored the importance of promoting regional agricultural products on a global stage. He emphasized the need for Geographical Indication (GI) registration for products like the Bagra Pineapple, noting that the state already has several GI-tagged products, including Arunachal Orange. He also emphasised on strengthening the Research & Development Wing of the State through the State Horticulture Research and Development Institute (SHRDI) and Krishi Vigyan Kendra's (KVK).

"By registering Bagra Pineapple as a GI product, we can protect its uniqueness and promote it in national and international markets," he said, while announcing plans to promote Arunachal's GI products at the upcoming Arunachal GI Mahotsav-2025 in New Delhi.

The Deputy Chief Minister reiterated the state government's commitment to the welfare of farmers and expressed optimism for the future of agriculture in Arunachal Pradesh. He encouraged the farmers of Bagra to continue their hard work and assured them that the government would continue to provide all necessary support for their growth and assured to look into their demands for the provision of fund for fencing of pineapple garden in Bagra, CC pavement road from NH-13 to Yamko and Lipu & Pigi- Mengo villages and declaration of Pine Apple Festival Bagra as a Calendar event.

He also felicitated the progressive farmers of the area and acknowledged their hard work and dedication in agriculture.

While Minister of Education, RWD, Tourism, etc, Pasang Dorjee Sona lauded the efforts of the community in promoting the pineapple produce from the area through the Pineapple Festival. He called to preserve the green coverage of the region and do our bit at our individual level to protect the natural environment to mitigate global warming. He further expressed hope for the growth of the festival bigger in days to come.

The festival was also attended by MLA (Basar), Nyabi Jini Dirchi, MLA (Aalo West), Topin Ete, Deputy Commissioner (West Siang), Miss Mamu Hage, DIGP Tumme Amo, Zilla Parishad Chairperson, Tumpe Ete, among others.

GTGH performs maiden triple nerve block surgery



ZIRO, January 17: A maiden triple nerve block surgery using ultra sound guided anesthesia was carried out at the Gyati Takka General Hospital (GTGH) here on Friday, January 17.

A patient's lower limb was successfully operated upon using ultra sound guided anesthesia for triple nerve blocks of femoral, saphenous and sciatic led by GTGH team of anesthetists Dr. Koj Jarbo, who is also the GTGH medical superintendent assisted by Drs. M. Muri and Subu Nobing. The surgical team was headed by senior orthopaedic Dr. Hage Taker and his team of nursing assistants.

The complicated surgery is also performed at TRIHMS, however the same was carried out for the first time at a District based hospital, informed Dr.Jarbo, who had been an anesthetist at TRIHMS prior to his

posting to GTGH.

Also a clinical anesthetist, Dr.Jarbo informed 'The ultra sound guided anesthesia surgery has many advantages over the conventional surgery using general anesthesia and spinal anesthesia. The chances of error and its consequences are almost reduced to nil. Further, it is much safer compared to the blind procedure followed during a conventional surgery and very convenient for all concerned including the patient and doctor'.

Adding further, Dr. Jarbo said 'such high-end procedures are now going to take place on regular basis at GTGH and many complicated cases will be solved within GTGH campus using the services of experts and specialists even from outside the state. At the end of the day, we are trying our best to treat the patients within GTGH campus instead of referring them outside to TRIHMS

or other hospitals for which we are prepared to go extra miles as in this case', said Dr.Jarbo.

Senior orthopaedic Dr. Hage Taker said 'In my career spanning more than two decades as an orthopaedic, this was the first complicated surgery which went seamlessly well due to use of sophisticated high end surgical process combined with the efficient team of doctors, anesthetists and nursing assistants of GTGH', while adding, this was his first major surgery post New Year for which he was glad as all went well.

The Gyati Takka General Hospital, one of the best District based hospital is equipped with the best of medical team of doctors and infrastructures. Recently the construction of hospital's new block has been completed and scheduled to be inaugurated soon and upgraded to a zonal hospital.

Over 1654 kg of cannabis seize by Kalaktang Police

ITANAGAR, January 20:

The Kalaktang Police in Arunachal Pradesh's West Kameng district has achieved a historic milestone under Operation Dawn 2.0, with the highest-ever seizure of suspected cannabis, weighing 1654.22 kg, worth about Rs 1.33 crore.

A team of police from Kalaktang PS led by Officer-in-Charge Padi Payang and SI David Tagi, under the supervision of Kalaktang SDPO Pawan Yadav, and the overall guidance of SP Shudhansu Dhama, achieved this remarkable feat during a well-coordinated raid in and around Betchilling village on Saturday, January 18 last.

Police said the seized cannabis was found in 108 rectangular packages (10 kg each) totalling 1080 kg and 33 gunny bags containing 574.22 kg contraband.

Police also recovered a 50-ton hydraulic piston jack used for compressing cannabis, modified iron trunk and iron frame, and a modified weighing machine.

These materials were used to compress, package, and conceal the cannabis for easier transportation.

In this regard, a case has been registered at Kalaktang Police Station under relevant sections of the

NDPS Act, SP Shudhansu Dhama said, adding that further investigations are underway to establish forward and backward linkages, with intensified efforts to apprehend the accused. Support from local villagers is being sought to expedite the investigation.

Under the broader Operation Dawn initiative, the West Kameng Police seized more than 5030 kg cannabis and other contrabands worth over Rs 4.5 crore in 2023-24. They also arrested 101 accused, underscoring their unwavering commitment to combating drug trafficking and safeguarding the community.

NDRF launches 15-day famex in Upper Siang



YINGKIONG, January 20:

The 12th battalion of the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) launched a 15-day familiarisation exercise (famex) on disaster management in Upper Siang district on Monday, January 20.

The programme, spearheaded by the District Disaster Management Authority (DDMA), aims at enhancing disaster resilience among students, teachers and the local community.

The exercise began with a school safety programme at Pedong Nane School here, targeting the students and teachers, focusing on building awareness, and imparting essential disaster management skills.

Sawin take stoke of ongoing development Schemes

Pasighat police destroyed over 80 modified bike silencers

PASIGHAT, January 17: As part of a special drive under 'Road Safety Month' campaign, about 80 illegally modified bike silencers that led to sound pollution, causing nuisance to the common public were seized and destroyed by Pasighat Police, said SP Pankaj Lamba on January 17.

Pasighat Police seized about 80 illegally modified bike silencers leading to sound pollution and causing nuisance to the common public. The bike silencers were seized as part of a special drive under 'Road Safety Month' campaign and later destroyed today using JCB at the Reserve Police Line (RPL) campus, in presence of SP Pankaj Lamba, DSP Ayup Boko, traffic

police officers and media persons. SP Lamba told reporters that seized modified silencers were found beyond the permissible decibel limits and in violation of traffic rules. Use of modified silencers is illegal and can result in fines and license suspension. It is directly related to the safety of children and senior citizens in particular and the general public as a whole on the road and we have a zero-tolerance policy regarding their safety.

The SP stated that people replace the factory fitted exhaust system of their bike or modify the fitted unit which results in the exhaust system emitting a loud noise way above the prescribed decibel limit which pose a

safety risk and increase the likelihood of accidents.

During our "Road Safety Month 2025" campaign led by the SP, police have fined numerous bike riders and seized/dismantled more than 80 modified silencers so far and finally destroyed today using JCB, the SP added.

While warning bike riders against the use of modified silencers, the SP advised them not to alter the company provided silencers and further informed that appropriate legal action will also be taken against the individuals/dealers involved in the manufacturing and sale of modified silencers.

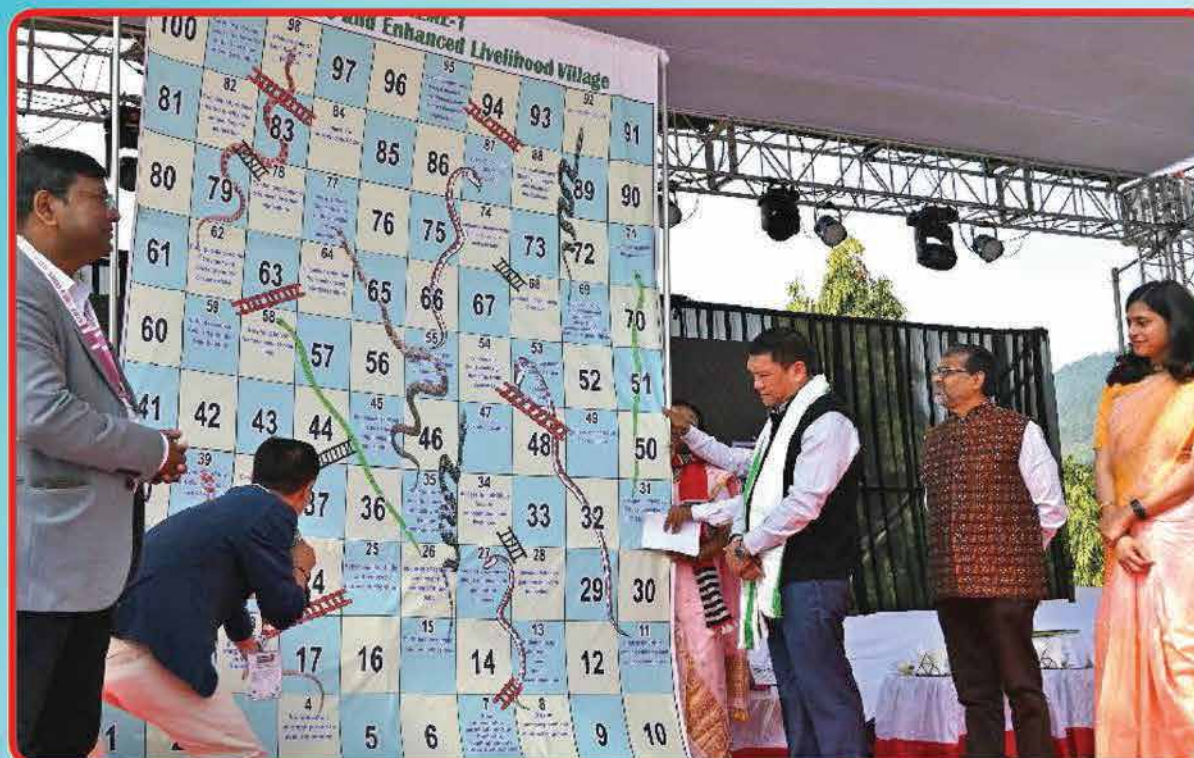

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First Adi- Apatani Summit inks joint declaration



PASIGHAT, January 19:
